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Georges Bataille throws down a challenge to Jean-Paul Sartre, who held that "literature is innocent". Bataille, in his examination of such figures as Emily Bronte, Sade, Baudelaire, Genet, Kafka and Michelet, and the component of "evil" in their works, argues that literature is, in fact, "guilty" and that, moreover, it must acknowledge itself as such.

The underlying notion is that 'evil' belongs to the realm of counter-productivity, savagery, deliberate perversion, and the transgression of boundaries. In Bataille's other writings this realm is that of the 'sacred', or 'experience'. 'Good' is the realm of utility, reason, modesty, and adulthood. One could also apply the name 'profane' to this.

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Bataille's fans expect from him a certain amount of taboo violation, though executed in a specific literary form — not just prose, but the distinctive sort of prose, whether spoken or written, brought to perfection by midcentury French intellectuals.

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
